This course is designed for intermediate level ESL/EFL students to help them develop automatic understanding and production of grammatical structures in speech and in writing. It provides a general overview of verb tenses and tense usage. It enables the learner to master correct usage of final -s/-es and subject-verb agreement, singular/plural and count/noncount distinctions, possessive forms, and articles. Moreover, it familiarizes them with pronouns and their use, modals, and the passive with its tense forms. It also focuses on pronouns and their use, Gerunds, conjunctions and cause-and-effect connectives. This course provides a solid foundation and equips students with skills essential to prepare for TOEFL, IELTS, or other higher academic pursuits.
